

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Do Historic Garden Week (HGW) tours sell out?

Normally tours do not sell out. A few tours open for 2022 have reduced their capacities to ensure a safe and enjoyable experience for both the visitors as well as the hosting volunteers. Additionally, some tours are selling a morning or an afternoon ticket, to further make certain social distancing can be properly maintained while visiting featured properties.

The Garden Club of Virginia follows CDC guidelines regarding COVID-19 and its variants. To minimize risk of spreading the virus, Garden Club of Virginia members, tour guests, volunteers, and homeowners will be required to wear face masks in all interior spaces associated with Historic Garden Week 2022 tours. Masks should cover both the nose and mouth. Those who do not follow this safety precaution will not be permitted entry into interior spaces.



Are tickets available on tour day?

Historic Garden Week 2022 features 28 tours, some of which are offering advanced tickets only. Nearly a dozen will be offering tickets on their tour day, for an additional \$10 pp. To find out which tours will have tickets available at their Tour Headquarters, please check the tour sections in the *Guidebook* and follow us on social media. Where can I pick up a Guidebook? Are they free?

Guidebooks are available at various locations around Virginia. For a list of outlets, www.vagardenweek.org. The Guidebook is free at these locations. You may also purchase a Guidebook online or by sending a check before March 26, 2022 to the Garden Club of Virginia, 12 East Franklin St., Richmond, VA 23219 in the amount of \$20. The cost of the Guidebook covers shipping and handling for this 200-page publication.

Where do we go first? Where do the tours start?

Start at the Tour Headquarters location listed in the *Guidebook* for each tour. To access a digital version of the 2022 *Guidebook* with complete logistical information regarding all tours, access it here: vagardenweek.org/main/guidebook. The Headquarters location is where you show your ticket, pick up a map or local brochure of the touring area, can ask questions and use the facilities, and generally, get oriented.

Where do we park?

Parking is normally available at Tour Headquarters locations. If the tour is a walking tour, this is the best place to park. Many neighborhoods cannot accommodate the additional traffic associated with Historic Garden Week tours that require driving to each location. In these cases, use designated parking areas marked with HGW signage. Do not block residential driveways. Please check individual tour webpages available at vagardenweek.org/main/tours for Google Maps of each touring area.

Are there restrooms available on tours?

There are no public restroom facilities at tour properties, but restrooms are often available at the Tour Headquarters or other designated locations in the tour area.

Can we visit all the tours over the 8 days of Historic Gadren Week? Sadly, it is not physically possible to attend all the tours over the course of Historic Garden Week. We've never been on Historic Garden Week. How do we pick a tour, or tours?

Is photography allowed?

Photography of any kind, including via cell phone, is prohibited inside tour properties, and some tours prohibit exterior photography as well. Please abide by signage. Many of the host garden clubs post professional quality pictures of the stunning flower arrangements on their Historic Garden Week Facebook and Instagram accounts.

What if it rains? And what is your refund policy?

Due to the unique circumstances involving COVID-19 cancellation of tour tickets with a full refund is available through 4 p.m. on Monday, April 4, 2022. This popular event is supported by a very small staff, therefore, cancellations after this date and time cannot be accommodated. However, ticket purchases can be converted to tax-deductible donations at the purchaser's

request for those choosing not to attend. The GCV is a non-profit organization. Tours are held rain or shine, except for tours that are inaccessible due to weather conditions. Please check social media for last minute changes to any of the tours offered this April.

What flowers will be blooming during Historic Garden Week?

Virginia is often at its height of springtime blooming during Historic Garden Week. The tours cover three different hardiness zones and weather is always a factor. Rest assured, however, that Mother Nature never disappoints. Visitors can expect to see tulips, peonies, iris, azaleas and dogwood. If it's been cool leading up to tours, there might be daffodils, camellia, wisteria and redbud too. If it's been warm, you might enjoy roses and hydrangea.

Are the tours accessible for people with disabilities?

Most Historic Garden week properties are private and therefore are not accessible for visitors with disabilities; those with physical limitations should be advised.

May children attend Historic Garden week tours?

Children 17 years of age and under must be accompanied by an adult at all times. Tours are produced and hosted by 48 different member clubs of the Garden Club of Virginia. While most tours are not geared towards very young visitors, some are more conducive than others.

Where do the proceeds go?

Tour proceeds fund the ongoing restoration and preservation of Virginia's most iconic historic public gardens and landscapes, as well as other lesser-known sites across the state. To date, the GCV has completed projects at nearly 50 locations. In addition, ticket sales fund a research fellowship program in landscape architecture that documents two significant gardens each year.
